

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF VALPARAISO COMMON COUNCIL
URGING THE INDIANA STATE LEGISLATURE TO PASS THE HOMETOWN
MATTERS LEGISLATION

Whereas, like in Valparaiso, Indiana, the quality of life in any community can be directly related to the responsiveness of local government and its ability to meet the needs and expectations of its citizens; and

Whereas, the citizens of Valparaiso, understand this connection and elect local leaders with certain expectations regarding the service they will provide and the role they will play in their lives; and

Whereas, those elected to serve here in our hometown in turn accept the privilege of service with the understanding of their responsibility and the expectations of the community; and

Whereas while a community can share in the joys, successes and setbacks of their city or town, the accountability for Valparaiso's viability, prosperity and overall well-being lies directly with those elected to serve in your local government; and

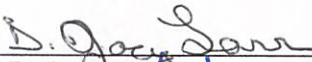
Whereas, in order for our local government to succeed and deliver according to the expectations of our citizens, we must be given the tools and authority to run our city/town in a manner that best fits the uniqueness and character we have groomed and maintained for nearly one hundred and fifty years; and
